'Spark New Ideas,' Dr. Simpson Tells Employees at Opening Day

A summer trip to Yellowstone National Park results in "advice from nature" and inspirational messages shared by the President.

Opening Day featured a presentation by Cypress police officials about preparing for and responding to an active shooter situation. The sobering but important message was the centerpiece of the campuswide meeting, which then closed with an inspirational tone as Dr. Simpson shared some "advice from nature."

Prompted by a visit to a Yellowstone National Park gift shop, the "Advice from Nature" segment included suggestions from a bear — such as "look after your honey" — and other animals and features found in the park. A hummingbird advises to "keep your visits short and sweet," a hot spring suggests "keep new ideas bubbling up," and the campfire offers "spark new ideas."

In that spirit, Dr. Simpson told employees that this period in the College's history provides a unique opportunity for change, growth, and innovation. It is a time to consider ideas employees feel strongly about and to enact them.

While the meeting closed on this high note, the College was focused upon a presentation by Cypress Police Chief Jackie Gomez-Whiteley and Lead Police Officer Michael Wintersole about how the

College's employees need to react in the event that someone opens fire on the campus. Wintersole, a first responder to the 2011 shooting at Salon Meritage in Seal Beach, underscored a three-point response strategy: 1) get out; 2) if that's not possible, hide out; and 3) if left with no other option, fight back.

On that last point, Wintersole emphasized that once you make that decision, it is critical to give it your all. He also informed employees of the critical need to comply instantly and fully with responding officers' commands. Every second spent responding to questions from staff is another moment that the shooter is on the loose. Wintersole also told employees that it is important that their hands be visible and their fingers spread apart when approaching officers — a clear indication that there is no threat.

To begin the meeting, Dr. Simpson also introduced 30 new employees, the largest group since the same number were hired in the 2008-2009 academic year.

Executive Vice President Santanu Bandyopadhyay, Vice President Karen Cant, Director of Institutional Research and Planning Phil Dykstra, and Executive Director of the Foundation and Community Relations Raúl Alvarez also presented.

Chancellor Ned Doffoney and NOCCCD Board of Trustees President Jeff Brown gave greetings from the District.

Trustees Place 'Measure J' on November Ballot in Hopes of Campus Renovations, Including the Cypress College SEM Building

On July 22, trustees for the North Orange County Community College District voted unanimously to place a facilities bond measure on this November's general election ballot. If approved by voters, Measure I would fund a variety of campus projects, including the complete renovation of the Science, Engineering, and Math Building.

The building, part of the original campus

construction, is in need of substantial renovation to the instructional space, including what has affectionately become known as Dr. Frankenstein's Lab.

In addition to SEM, Cypress College plans a veterans' resource center, renovation of Fine Arts, and a number of other projects consistent with the vision expressed in the facilities master plan.

While public employees can share factual information about College needs or the specifics of what the bond would provide, campaigning — either for or against the measure — is strictly prohibited during work hours or with the use of any District-owned property. This restriction extends to College email accounts, phones, and physical workstations.

Enrollment, FTES Projections Shared at Opening Day

Cypress College plans to increase enrollment by 5% this academic year, the first significant growth since the state economic downturn began restricting funding late last decade.

Executive Vice President Santanu Bandyopadhyay discussed the College's enrollment plans during last Friday's Opening Day meeting. The College is targeting a 2014-2015 enrollment of 11,375.82, up from an actual 2013-2014 enrollment target of 10,982.12 full-time equivalent students (FTES).

The presentation included a segment on "FTES 101" to provide context for the enrollment measure used by the state to determine funding for Cypress College. One FTES is comprised of 525 instructional hours, the result of calculating 15 hours per week for two semesters (based on a 17.5-week semester). A single FTES is derived from any combination of this criteria — for example two students enrolled in 15 units for a semester

each, or 5 students enrolled in 3 units for both the fall and spring semesters. The District is funded at \$4,636.49 per FTES, though the FTES number is capped.

Among the enrollment-management challenges faced by the College, Bandyopadhyay identified that:

- Demand is not uniform across divisions
- Seat availability is constrained by:
 - Facilities
 - Cost
 - Effective Pathways
- Unmet demand (not a complete list)
 - Communication—712
 - English 1,213
 - Math -2,001
 - Biology 994
 - Psychology 360
 - The list is long.....

Budget Outlook Brighter than 2013-14; M&O Projects Completed

Vice President Karen Cant delivered her mostupbeat Opening Day budget presentation since moving into her current role in 2007. The best news: there are no budget cuts for the 2014-2015 academic year.

Other highlights:

- Access (growth) 2.75% (NOCCD target is 5%)
- COLA .85%
- Categoricals: \$100m for SSSP, \$70m for Student Equity, \$30m for DSPS
- \$30 million for Deferred Maintenance and Instructional Equipment
- Prop 39 Energy Grant \$47 million to be allocated to sites based on FTES

Concerns about the enacted budget include:

- Match requirements for categoricals are high
- Proposition 30 is temporary
 - Sales tax increase ends 2016. Income tax increase ends 2018.

- Potential long-term loss to NOCCCD is approximately \$24 million annually
- STRS obligation increase of 19.1% projected w/no resource ID'd

All of last year's one-time budget requests were funded. This year, \$1.7 million is planned for that program. The projected deficit in the Extended Day budget is approximately \$900,000. Both of these will be funded from the College's carryover balance of \$8.5 million.

Facilities projects completed during the summer include: lighting retrofit project; parking lot repair and re-striping; re-finishing of the gym floors; HVAC projects in TE-II, TE-III, and Gym 2; and a fire alarm upgrade in Humanities. In addition, the new marquee should be installed by the end of the calendar year.

Cant also highlighted the conversion of all campus email to the Microsoft 365 platform, a project that was two years in the planning.

Accreditation, Strategic Plan Top IR & P Discussion List at Opening Day Meeting

Phil Dykstra, the College's Director of Institutional Research and Planning, reported at Opening Day that Cypress College's 201 mid-term accreditation report was accepted by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges this summer. Approval of the document closes the last accreditation cycle.

This semester, the campus will select a self study chair in preparation for the 2017 site visit. Among the changes to the accreditation process, site visits will now take place every seven years rather than six. The process now includes new standards for the self study. These include one on institutional integrity.

Dykstras also indicated that work on development of the 2014-2017 Strategic Plan is wrapping up. Comments on the draft document are due on Tuesday. Visit http://www.cypresscollege.edu/sp1417 and use your normal computer log-in information to access the draft version of the strategic plan, which was developed at last semester's colloquium.

The plan and the comments will be presented to the Planning and Budget Committee on Thursday, September 4.

The new plan is streamlined — featuring three directions instead of five. They are: student success; organizational effectiveness and excellence; and strong community connections. The plan also features 13 objectives, down from 16, and has 36 objectives, an increase from 29 in the previous plan.

Planning in Progress for Celebration of College's 50th Anniversary in 2015-2016


Cypress College's 50th anniversary celebration will focus on three primary audiences: the campus community; alumni and retirees; and the local community.

The proposed activities include: A celebration incorporating the re-creation of the 1966 flag pole ceremony on the College's very first day of operation; a two-part open house and reunion, with events in individual areas and a campus-wide gathering at the Pond; a "Where are they Now?" featuring the success stories of alumni; a historical display; and an anniversary theme for the 2017 Americana Awards.

Other activities will be announced as the anniversary approaches.

Information about Measure J

Q: What is Measure J?

A: On July 22nd, the North Orange County Community College District Board of Trustees voted unanimously to place Measure J – the Fullerton College, Cypress College Repair and Student/Veteran Job Training Measure – on the November 4, 2014 ballot to repair and update our District's facilities to ensure quality, affordable education and job training for local students and veterans.

Fullerton and Cypress Colleges and our School of Continuing Education serve the communities of Anaheim, Fullerton, Yorba Linda, Cypress, Buena Park, Placentia, Brea, La Habra, La Habra Heights, La Palma, Los Alamitos, Placentia, Rossmoor, Garden Grove, La Mirada, Orange, Seal Beach, Stanton, and Whittier.

Q: Why was Measure J placed on the ballot?

A: With the cost of attending California's public universities more than six times that of attending a community college, more local students, veterans, and their families are relying on Fullerton and Cypress Colleges. Measure J addresses critical needs at our Colleges, improving facilities to ensure opportunities for local students to earn college credits, certifications, and job skills at a reasonable price.

Q: How does Measure J impact job training?

A: It is very difficult to get a job in the current sluggish economy. Fullerton and Cypress Colleges provide the hands-on career training and workforce preparation skills students need to have any chance of succeeding in a very competitive job market. Measure J upgrades facilities and technology to improve training and education locally in nursing, science, technology, engineering and math to meet the needs of local employers, keep high-paying jobs in our area, and attract more high-tech jobs.

Q: Will Measure J address Veterans' needs?

A: Yes. Fullerton and Cypress Colleges serve thousands of local military veterans and their families. Many of them have recently returned from war zones and face challenges including post-traumatic stress disorder and permanent disabilities.

Measure J upgrades and expands veterans' facilities and services, improves access for disabled students, and expands job-placement facilities to train and re-train veterans as they re-enter the civilian workforce. Measure J allows our Colleges' to give veterans the support they need to complete their education.

Q: How does Measure J impact education?

A: Fullerton College is one of the top transfer schools to four-year universities in California, with Cypress College students not far behind. Without community colleges, many students wouldn't make it into a four-year university. Measure J allows us to invest in upgrading our local community colleges' outdated technology, science labs and classrooms to continue to prepare students with the required knowledge and skills to successfully transfer to Cal State or UC schools in such high numbers.

Q: What priorities would Measure J address?

A: If adopted by voters, Measure J will address facilities needs relating to:

- ✓ Improving nursing, science, technology, engineering, math & technical job training facilities
- ✓ Improving educational resources and support services for veterans
- ✓ Preparing local students and returning veterans for university and jobs
- ✓ Training a qualified workforce to keep high paying jobs in our area and attract more high-tech jobs

Q: What does Measure J cost, and is there accountability?

A: Measure J is a \$574 million education bond. It includes strict accountability requirements including a Citizens' Oversight Committee and independent annual financial performance audits to ensure Measure J funds are spent only on voter authorized projects.

- By law, the Citizens' Oversight Committee must include, among others, representation of a bona fide Taxpayers' Association, a Business Organization, and a Senior Citizens' Organization.
- No Measure J funds can go toward administrator salaries or pensions.
- All funds will be used locally and cannot be taken by Sacramento.

Q: When is the election?

A: Election Day is November 4, 2014. The last day to register to vote is October 20th. To register online visit: RegisterToVote.ca.gov.

Financial Aid Office

Q: What does the September 8, 2014 "FREEZE DATE" for financial aid mean?

A: Financial Aid will only pay for units you are enrolled in as of the "Freeze DATE". NO EXCEPTIONS! This includes waitlisted and short-term courses. You must be in all of your units for financial aid purposes by September 8, 2014. Students will not be paid for classes added after the "FREEZE DATE".

Q: Enrolled in Late-Start Classes?

A: Your initial disbursement may be less if you are enrolled in any late-start classes. Please note that financial aid pays for your late-start units on the second Friday from the date the late-start class begins.

Q: How do I know if I am getting a Financial Aid Award?

A: In order to be considered for the first payment (the first Friday of classes, August 29, 2014), students must have a **completed** file with the financial aid office by August 20, 2014. If you are a continuing student and your file is already completed, check your myGateway account for your Fall 2014 eligibility.

You must track your file in myGateway and submit all requested documents needed to complete your file. Any changes to the application or file may result in a delay in the awarding process, which would delay the disbursement. Only completed files can be guaranteed for the first disbursement.

Q: What is the North Orange Card?

A: Once your financial aid file is processed all funds are deposited to your North Orange Card. Once a student registers for classes and has a completed financial aid file, they will be mailed a North Orange Card. **Current students who had aid in the past will continue to use their existing North Orange Card.** Cards are mailed to the student's address on record with Admissions and Records. Therefore, it is important that your current address is on file with the Admissions and Records Office. Students will be able to use their North Orange card without being charged the ATM fee at the Schools First ATM machines located on the Cypress College campus by the Business building in front of the bookstore, at the Anaheim campus, and at Fullerton College.

Q: What if I Withdraw?

A: Beginning the first Friday of the semester, disbursements are made weekly to eligible students. Awards will be calculated up and down based on your units enrolled through the freeze date. Your award is adjusted based on your actual units enrolled. Therefore, if you drop units prior to the freeze date, you may be required to repay back all or a portion of your aid received. If you drop units before the freeze date, you may not be eligible for second payment if you are receiving Pell grants. Students who are paid financial aid and fail to show-up to class will be dropped by the instructor and may be required to repay all aid received. Please note that holds may also be placed until repayment is made.

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

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


