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Jeanne Clery Disclosure Act

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, codified at 20 USC 1092 (f) as a part of the Higher Education Act of 1965, is a federal law that requires colleges and universities to disclose certain timely and annual information about campus crime and security policies. All public and private post-secondary educational institutions participating in federal student aid programs are required to comply with it.

Congress enacted the original legislation in 1990, as the Campus Security Act; Howard and Connie Clery pursued the legislation after their daughter Jeanne Clery was murdered at Lehigh University in 1986. Amendments to the Act in 1998 renamed it in memory of Jeanne Clery. The Clery Act requires colleges and universities to publish an annual report by October 1st of each year. The law requires institutions of higher education to publish three years of crime statistics. The Jeanne Clery Act has been amended regularly over the last 20 years in order to reflect the changes to campus safety.

Introduction

The Cypress College Department of Campus Safety prepares this report annually to comply with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act. The report is available on the Cypress College website at <http://www.cypresscollege.edu>. The report is prepared in cooperation with the local law enforcement agencies neighboring the Cypress College Campus.

The campus crime, arrest and referral statistics include those reported to the Cypress Police Department, the Cypress College Department of Campus Safety, and other campus officials.

Students and employees will receive an e-mail notification of the websites where this report is located. Copies of the report may be obtained at the Cypress College Department of Campus Safety Office. The department is located at 9200 Valley View Street, Cypress CA. 90630. The Campus Safety Department is open from 7:30 a.m.-6:30 p.m., Monday – Thursday, and 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. on Fridays. The Campus Safety Department can be reached by phone at (714) 484-7387.

Cypress College Department of Campus Safety

All Cypress College Campus Safety Officers are non-sworn public officers that work within the limits of the authority granted by the Board of Trustees of the North Orange County Community College District. Cypress College Campus Safety Officers receive a variety of professional training, including certification and completion of a Basic Arrest Course PC 832, Campus Law Enforcement Course PC 832.3 and First Aid/CPR/AED certification, as well as training designed to meet the needs of the campus community. Campus Safety Officers patrol and monitor the campus 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The primary mission of the department is to promote safety awareness in a college environment. The staff assists the community by providing the safest possible environment within the scope of their authority, training, job duties, and abilities. Duties include proactive high-visibility patrols, video surveillance, building access control, criminal and traffic investigations, safety escorts, reporting safety hazards, and providing assistance to other law enforcement agencies.

Student employees, Campus Safety Cadets, of the Campus Safety Department provide support services to the department and campus community. The student employees assist with patrolling the campus parking lots and buildings, conducting parking enforcement and traffic control, providing escorts, special events staffing, and emergency operations.

Campus Security Authorities

Students, staff, faculty, contractors and visitors on campus may report crime to staff of the Campus Safety Department, which is designated as the “campus security authority.” A “campus security authority” is an official of an institution who has significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including, but not limited to, student discipline, and campus judicial proceedings. An official is any person who has the authority and the duty to take action or respond to particular issues on behalf of the institution. This may include but is not limited to Health Center staff, athletic coaches, faculty advisors, deans, club advisors, and managers.

Local Police - City of Cypress Police Department

The Cypress College Campus Safety Department maintains a strong partnership with the Cypress Police Department. The North Orange County Community College District has a memorandum of understanding with the City of Cypress regarding police support to Cypress College. All criminal incidents are reported to the Cypress Police Department. The Cypress Police Department maintains reports and statistics for the criminal activity on the campus and the sidewalk adjacent to the campus. The Cypress Police Department is located at 5275 Orange Ave. Cypress, CA 90630. The telephone number is (714) 229-6600. Crime statistics included in this report are those required by the Clery Act.

Reporting Criminal Activity

Students, employees, and visitors on campus may report criminal activity to the Campus Safety Department. Crimes may also be reported to Health Center staff, athletic coaches, faculty advisors, deans, and club advisors.

The Daily Crime Log

The Cypress College Campus Safety Department maintains a daily crime log of criminal activity and alleged criminal behavior reported to the Department. The daily crime log reflects the time and date the crime was reported, the location and nature of the reported incident, along with a disposition. The Department may withhold information from the daily crime log if the release of such information would jeopardize the safety of an individual or an ongoing criminal investigation. Reporting a Crime or Emergency

Cypress College Campus Safety Officers will respond to, and address all criminal activity and emergencies on campus. All students, employees, and visitors are encouraged to report criminal activity, suspicious persons, and suspicious activity to the Campus Safety Department immediately. In the event you are a witness or a victim of crime, please contact the Campus Safety Department at (714) 484-7387, Cypress Police at (714) 229-6600, or call 911. You may also use an emergency red phone or Code Blue phone located throughout the campus and in parking lots. The Cypress Police Department is located at 5275 Orange Avenue, Cypress, CA 90630.

Anonymous/Confidential Reporting

In certain instances, a crime victim may be reluctant to file a report fearing the “process” or loss of anonymity. In such circumstances, crime victims are encouraged to make a confidential report to the authorities mentioned in the paragraph above. Those who make a confidential report will receive important advice and referral information. Confidential reports are important because they provide a more accurate portrait of actual campus crime.

Charger Assessment Team (ChAT)

The Charger Assessment Team (ChAT, aka BIT) serves as the centralized body for discussion, appropriate intervention, and coordinated action regarding disruptive, problematic, or concerning student behavior. The ChAT program provides support to students who may be in distress or whose behavior is of concern to others before their behavior escalates.

The mission of the ChAT program is to support the safety and well-being of the campus community by employing a proactive and collaborative approach to identify, assess, and manage behavioral concerns.

Sexual Assault, Harassment, and Misconduct Guidelines

Cypress College strives to preserve a respectful, safe, and non-threatening environment for its students, faculty, and staff. The sexual misconduct guidelines clarify resources available to members of the college community, define prohibited conduct, provide bystander and prevention guidelines, and formulate the procedures for addressing reports of sexual misconduct incidents. Cypress College will take the necessary steps to discipline individuals who violate these guidelines. Violators may be subject to sanctions under the student code of conduct (B.P. 5500) and criminal prosecution under California law.

General Statement of Prohibition

The North Orange County Community College District prohibits sexual discrimination, sexual misconduct, and other forms of violence, including but not limited to sexual assault, sexual violence, sexual harassment, sexual exploitation, stalking, dating and domestic violence. Members of the college community should be able to focus on academic endeavors in an environment free from all forms of violence, misconduct, harassment, and discrimination.

The North Orange County Community College District prohibits retaliation against a person who reports sexual harassment or sexual violence, assists someone with a report of sexual harassment or sexual violence, or participates in any manner in an investigation or resolution of a sexual harassment or sexual violence report. Retaliation includes threats, intimidation, reprisals, and/or adverse actions related to employment or education.

Cypress College is committed to cultivating an environment that promotes prompt reporting of sexual violence and prudent and just adjudication of sexual misconduct cases. Cypress College will provide protection of rights, requests for privacy of the complainant making sexual misconduct allegations, as well as the rights of those accused of sexual misconduct allegations. Cypress College will adhere to all federal, state, and local requirements for the investigation, crime reporting, intervention, data gathering, preservation and standards of evidence and privacy provisions related to sexual misconduct and sex discrimination.

Creating a respectful, safe, and non-threatening environment is the responsibility of all members of the community. All students and staff are encouraged to report acts of sexual misconduct, sex discrimination and other forms of violence.

This prohibition extends to acts both on and off campus where there is a college affiliation. Furthermore, acts are prohibited which are committed on the campus because of the actual or perceived race, religion, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, ethnicity, national origin, or disability of the victim.

Cypress College will take the necessary steps to provide confidentiality unless the victim waives that right.

Definitions of Sexual Misconduct

Sexual Assault occurs when physical sexual activity is engaged without the consent of the other person or when the other person is unable to consent to the activity. The activity or conduct may include physical force, violence, threat, or intimidation, ignoring the objections of the other person, causing the other person's intoxication or incapacitation through the use of drugs or alcohol, or taking advantage of the other person's incapacitation (including voluntary intoxication).

Consent is informed. Consent is an affirmative, unambiguous, and conscious decision by each participant to engage in mutually agreed-upon sexual activity.

Consent is voluntary. It must be given without coercion, force, threats, or intimidation. Consent means positive cooperation in the act or expression of intent to engage in the act pursuant to an exercise of free will.

Consent is revocable. Consent to some form of sexual activity does not imply consent to other forms of sexual activity. Consent to sexual activity on one occasion is not consent to engage in sexual activity on another occasion. A current or previous dating or sexual relationship, by itself, is not sufficient to constitute consent. Even in the context of a relationship, there must be mutual consent to engage in sexual activity. Consent must be ongoing throughout a sexual encounter and can be revoked at any time. Once consent is withdrawn, the sexual activity must stop immediately.

An incapacitated person cannot give consent. A person cannot consent if they are unconscious or coming in and out of consciousness. A person cannot consent if they are under the threat of violence, bodily injury or other forms of coercion. A person with a physical or mental impairment cannot give consent. For purposes of this Policy, the age of consent is consistent with California Penal Code Section 261.5.

Incapacitation is defined as the physical and/or mental inability to make informed, rational judgments. States of incapacitation include, but are not limited to, unconsciousness, sleep, and blackouts. Where alcohol or drugs are involved, incapacitation is defined with respect to how the alcohol or other drugs consumed affects a person's decision-making capacity, awareness of consequences, and ability to make fully informed judgments. Being intoxicated by drugs or alcohol does not diminish one's responsibility to obtain consent. The factors to be considered when determining whether consent was given include whether the accused knew, or whether a reasonable person should have known, that the complainant was incapacitated.

Sexual Violence is defined as physical sexual acts engaged without the consent of the other person or, when the other person is unable to consent to the activity. Sexual violence includes sexual assault, rape, battery, and sexual coercion; domestic violence; dating violence; and stalking.

Domestic Violence is defined as abuse committed against an adult or a minor who is a spouse or former spouse, cohabitant or former cohabitant, or someone with whom the abuser has a child, has an existing dating or engagement relationship, or has had a former dating or engagement relationship.

Dating Violence is defined as abuse committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim.

Rape is an act of sexual intercourse accomplished against a person's will by means of force, violence, duress, menace or fear and without consent as described in this policy.

Sexual Battery is unsolicited and unwanted touching of an intimate part, (sexual organ, anus, groin, buttocks, and the breast of a female) of another person's body and without consent as described in this policy.

Forcible Sodomy is oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, by force or fear, and against his or her will and without consent as described in this policy.

Sexual Assault with an Object is the use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slight, the genital or anal opening of another person, forcibly and against his or her will without consent as described in this policy.

Stalking is a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to feel fear, or emotional distress. The conduct must include two or more acts committed directly or by the stalker, or through third party by any action, method, or means; such as following, monitoring, observation, surveillances, or threats. The conduct may also include communicating to or about a person or interfering with a third person's property.

Sexual Exploitation is defined as non-consensual or abusive sexual advantage of another for his/ her own benefit, or to benefit anyone other than the one being exploited. Examples include engaging in voyeurism, forwarding pornographic or sexually inappropriate material via e-mail or other channels to non-consenting students/groups. In addition, any activity that goes beyond the boundaries of consent such as recording sexual activity or letting others watch consensual sex.

Sexual Harassment is defined as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal, nonverbal, or physical conduct of a sexual nature. Sexual harassment is conduct that explicitly or implicitly affects a person's employment or education and/or interferes with a person's work or educational performance or creates an environment such that a reasonable person would find the conduct intimidating, hostile, or offensive.

Sexual Misconduct Complaints

A complainant can contact the Office of Equity and Diversity or the Director of Human Resources by telephone, in writing, or in person to file a complaint of sexual assault or harassment. After the complainant files the grievance, the District will make efforts to resolve the complainants concerns; this applies whether or not they have filed a formal complaint.

A formal complaint is a written and signed statement meeting the requirements of section 59328 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations as provided in section 4.0 of Board Administrative Procedures (AP 3430). Cypress College takes all incidents of sexual misconduct very seriously. There are several options to make a complaint of sexual misconduct. Students and staff may make a formal or informal complaint.

Not all-sexual misconduct is criminal behavior. Campus Safety staff will contact the local police department to assist students and staff in determining whether the conduct experienced was criminal in nature and warrants a criminal complaint.

Sexual Misconduct and Harassment; Complainant and Accused Rights:

If you decide to file a complaint for sexual misconduct:

- You have a right to report sexual misconduct including sexual assault, sexual harassment, dating and domestic violence and stalking.
- You have a right to receive a fair and impartial investigation from the initial process to the final result for all complaints of sexual misconduct.
- You have a right to request confidentiality during the process.
- You have a right to be informed by campus officials of options to notify law enforcement authorities including Campus Safety.
- You have a right to be informed that you are not obligated to report the incident to law enforcement officials.
- You have a right to have others present (in support or advisory roles) during a campus disciplinary hearing.
- You have the right to be notified in writing of the outcome of your complaint and any appeal, including any sanctions that directly relate to you.

- You have a right to be notified of available counseling, mental health or student services for victims of sexual misconduct, both on and off campus.
- You have a right to be notified of interim protective measures such as, academic accommodations or information on protective orders, and or safety escorts.
- You have the right to request a change as to your academic situation.

If you are accused of sexual misconduct:

- You have a right to receive a fair and impartial investigation from the initial process to the final result for all complaints of sexual misconduct.
- You have a right to have others present (in support or advisory roles) during a campus disciplinary hearing.
- You have a right to appeal the outcome of the disciplinary proceeding.
- You have the right to be notified in writing of the outcome of your complaint and any appeal, including any sanctions that directly relate to you.

Disclosure of Hearing Outcomes

Upon completion of a hearing on an act of violence, a non-forcible sex offense, sexual harassment, or a stalking charge, the Hearing Officer or a Designee will inform the alleged victim of the hearing outcome.

In accordance with Section 487 (a) (26) of the Higher Education Opportunity Act, which states:

“The institution will, upon written request, disclose to the alleged victim of any crime of violence (as that term is defined in Section 16 of title 18, United States Code), or a non-forcible sex offense, the report on the results of any disciplinary proceeding conducted by such institution against a student who is the alleged perpetrator of such crime or offense with respect to such crime or offense. If the alleged victim of such crime or offense is deceased as a result of such crime or offense, the next of kin of such victim shall be treated as the alleged victim for purposes of this paragraph.”

Cypress College has also established the following protocol for the written disclosure of such information:

A written request (sent via postal mail or email) from the alleged victim should include his or her name, mailing address, phone number, and the date of the hearing. This request should be sent to the Hearing Officer or Designee.

Correspondence outlining the results of the hearing in question (specifically, the decision of responsibility and the assigned sanctions, if applicable) will be mailed to the alleged victim within three (3) business days of the receipt of the request.

Violators may be subject to sanctions under the student code of conduct (B.P. 5500, A.P.5500), disciplinary action, and /or criminal prosecution under California law.

Sexual Misconduct Prevention

- Be aware of your surroundings. Knowing where you are and who is around you may help you to find a way to get out of a bad situation or prevent it.
- Try to avoid isolated areas. It is more difficult to get help if no one is around.
- Walk with purpose. Even if you don't know where you are going, act like you do.
- Trust your instincts. If a situation or location feels unsafe or uncomfortable, it probably isn't the best place to be.
- Try not to load yourself down with packages or bags as this can make you appear more vulnerable or hinder your ability to escape.
- Make sure your cell phone is with you, and charged. Program the Campus Safety and police contact numbers in your phone on speed dial.
- Don't allow yourself to be isolated with someone you don't trust or someone you don't know.
- Avoid putting music headphones in both ears so that you can be more aware of your surroundings, especially if you are walking alone.
- Call for a safety escort from Campus Safety at (714) 484-7387, if necessary.
- Use the Emergency telephones (identified with blue lights) if you need assistance on campus.
- Lock your car after entering and exiting it.
- Report suspicious behavior to Campus Safety.

If you need to get out of an uncomfortable or scary situation here are some things that you can try:

- Remember that being in this situation is not your fault. You did not do anything wrong, it is the person who is making you uncomfortable that is to blame.
- Be true to yourself. Don't feel obligated to do anything you don't want to do.
- Have a code word with your friends or family so that if you don't feel comfortable you can call them and communicate your discomfort without the person you are with knowing. Your friends or family can then come to get you or make up an excuse for you to leave.
- Think of a safety plan / escape route. Where are the doors and exits? Are there people around who might be able to help you? Is there an emergency phone nearby?
- If you and/or the other person have been drinking, you can say that you would rather wait until you both have your full judgment before doing anything you may regret later.
- If you see Something, Say Something!

Guide to Reporting Sexual Assault, Dating and Domestic Violence

If you are a victim of a sexual assault or have experienced dating, or domestic violence, consider the following:

- Go to a safe place and/or find someone you can trust. If possible, separate yourself from the alleged perpetrator(s).
- When it is safe to do so contact the Cypress Police Department or Campus Safety.
- Obtain medical assistance if needed.
- Make note of the details of the location.
- Take into account the physical details of the assailant, write things down as soon as possible.
- Preserve evidence. Do not wash away, destroy, discard, or delete any physical material.

Reporting Stalking

If you believe that you may be a victim of an intrusive contact and/or stalking, report the incident(s) immediately to Campus Safety or the Police, consider the following:

- End all communication with the person who is stalking you.
- Document the stalking, write a detailed summary of each event.
- Consider obtaining a restraining order.
- Change your routine.
- Let family, friends, and your employer know you are being stalked.
- Don't share personal information on social media or public places.
- Use filters and blockers to block unwanted email.
- Save all copies of communication from a cyber-stalker.

Bystander Intervention

If you know someone who may be at risk for sexual assault or other types of violence

- Take Action.
- Be a good friend, be supportive, and listen.
- Stay safe and avoid conflict!
- Encourage your friend to contact someone for assistance: Campus Safety, the Police, the Health Center, the hospital, or a counselor.
- Let your friend know that professional help is available through the National Sexual Assault Hotline, 1-800-656-HOPE and the National Sexual Assault Online Hotline.

Distribution of Sexual Misconduct Information

Information about Title IX grievances and sexual assault is available in the Cypress College catalog, the class schedule, on MyGateway, on the Cypress College Campus Safety and Health Center websites, as well as the School of Continuing Education Class Schedule. A procedure for complaints of unlawful discrimination and sexual harassment is available in the student handbook. In addition, copies of these guidelines and procedures will be available in Human Resources, Counseling Office, Health Center and the Campus Safety Department.

Reporting Hate Crimes and Hate Incidents

A hate crime is a criminal offense committed against persons, property or society that is motivated, in whole or in part, by an offender's bias against an individual's or a group's perceived race, religion, ethnic/national origin, gender, age, disability or sexual orientation. Not all expressions of hate or group bias rise to the level of a hate crime as defined in standard federal statutes. Derogatory words or epithets directed against a member of a previously defined group because they are a member of such group, if not accompanied by a threat of harm with the ability to carry it out, are protected speech and not a hate crime. However, these incidents constitute a hate related incident. A hate crime or incident may have occurred if any of the following were present: graffiti, verbal intimidation threats, harassment, trespassing and stalking, property damage, arson, hate mail (including e-mail), murder, physical assault and threats, or an attack with a weapon.

North Orange County Community College District Policies

Alcohol and Drugs Policy

The Cypress College Campus Safety Department supports the Board of Trustees of the North Orange County Community College District policies regulating the use of alcoholic beverages on campus. The North Orange County Community College District is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy environment for the campus community. Alcohol and other drugs should not interfere with the educational mission.

The North Orange County Community College District has been designated “Drug Free” and only under certain circumstances is the consumption of alcohol permitted. The possession, sale, manufacture, or distribution of any controlled substance is illegal under state and/or federal laws. Violators are subject to disciplinary action, criminal prosecution, fine, and imprisonment.

It is unlawful to sell, furnish, or provide alcohol to a person under the age of 21. The possession of alcohol by anyone under the age of 21 in a public place or a place open to the public is illegal.

It is also a violation of this policy for anyone to consume or possess alcohol in any public or a private area of campus without prior District approval. Organizations or groups that violate the alcohol or substance policy or state laws may be subject to sanctions by the District.

Cypress College is an alcohol and drug free educational institution. Cypress College advocates prevention through education and intervention.

Sexual Assault, Harassment, and Misconduct Policy / Title IX

The North Orange County Community College District has established policies related to sexual assault and misconduct on campus. These are described in Board Policy and Administrative Procedure 3540.

Included in this section is information on the Title IX federal rights law and ways to avoid sexual assault and misconduct, which includes, but is not limited to: rape, dating violence, domestic violence, sexual harassment, stalking, and sexual assault.

If you become the victim of sexual assault or misconduct, we urge you to speak with NOCCCD's Title IX Office or any of our Title IX coordinators, Campus Safety Departments, or Student Health Services staff. NOCCCD takes sexual assault, misconduct and violence allegations seriously, and will make every effort to thoroughly investigate all claims.

California Sex Offender Registrants Policy

Sex offenders are required to register with the Cypress Police Department and the Campus Safety Department at the beginning of each semester. In 2004, Megan's law was passed. The law requires law enforcement agencies to advise the public about registered sex offenders from whom they may be at risk. California Law requires sex offenders to update their information annually within five working days of their birthday. Crime Prevention Programs

Personal Safety Escorts

We encourage faculty, staff and students who are here in the evening to walk in groups to the parking lot. Students and employees may receive personal safety escorts to locations on campus upon request. Cypress College Campus Safety staff is available 24 hours a day. Emergency Telephones

Use these phones to report any type of emergency such as fire, medical, crime-in-progress, or if you simply need assistance. Emergency telephones are located in various locations throughout. Emergency phones that are accessible outside of buildings are designated on the campus map. Emergency Preparation and Response

Emergency Action Plans

Cypress College disseminates Emergency Action Plans to the campus community annually prior to each emergency drill. The goal of each action plan is to ensure the safety and welfare of the students, employees, and visitors.

National Incident Management System

As mandated by the laws of the State of California, the Incident Command System (ICS) has been adopted by Cypress College. Cypress College utilizes the ICS as an emergency-management tool for all responses to, and management of, multi-agency and/or multi-jurisdiction emergencies, as well as to facilitate communications and coordination between jurisdictional Emergency Operation Centers and outside agencies.

Cypress College Emergency Training

The goal of the emergency management training is to present students and employees with general information about emergency procedures, notification procedures and protective action regarding potential hazards on campus. The training is offered annually.

The yearly training topics may include, but are not limited to: Incident Command System courses 100, 200, 300, 400, 700, and 800; mass shelter in place operations; active shooter; fire suppression safety; non-violent physical crisis intervention techniques, Stryker chair training; mobile radio and communication etiquette; search and rescue techniques; first aid/CPR/AED; and emergency procedures.

Emergency Drills and Exercises

Cypress College conducts at least one announced emergency preparedness exercise and drill annually to improve emergency management response, communication and coordination efforts.

Students and Emergencies

Students should evacuate buildings in an orderly manner when an alarm sounds or when directed to do so by employees or emergency personnel.

To facilitate response in an emergency, students should always carry a Photo ID; provide emergency contact information to those who would need it; and to comply quickly and calmly with instructions from emergency responders including college officials and police. Communication with the campus community is guided by the NOCCCD Incident Communication Plan, which details the multiple methods available. Some of these are described in the section below.

Timely Warnings and Emergency Notification

Timely Warning Notice

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure Act defines certain specific crimes that require a timely warning notice to be issued. Any situation or incident involving a serious or continuing threat to the person and/or property of students and employees will require that a timely warning be sent to the community. Examples include but are not limited to: criminal homicide, sexual assault offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, arson, hate crimes, persons with weapons with intent to use, and threats of violent crime.

The timely warning shall be issued as soon as the pertinent information is available.

The timely warning shall include all information that would promote safety. The issuing of these notices will be decided on a case-by-case basis in light of all of the facts surrounding the incident, including factors such as the nature of the crime, or the continuing danger to the campus community and the possible risk of compromising law enforcement efforts.

Generally, the warning will specify the type of reported crime, the time and location at which the reported crime occurred, and basic safety tips. However, in some cases, all facts may not be reported.

These warnings are developed in consultation with a number of campus officials, including Campus Safety, the Office of Campus Communication, and the college's executive-level leadership. Warnings are typically posted on the Cypress College website, CypressCollege.edu, social media sites, the MyGateway portal, and a variety of other methods, which may include: traditional media outlets; mass communication systems for telephone, cellular, email, and/or text messages; the campus marquee and other digital message boards; public address system; and mobile radio.

Emergency Notification

An emergency notification will be distributed when there is a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees occurring on the campus. These emergency notifications may be directed to a specific segment or segments of the campus community who may be at risk. Cypress College is committed to immediate notification of emergency situations. Decision making during an emergency will be based on the campus community's safety.

When there is a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees occurring on the campus, the college will issue an emergency notification at the approval of the President or an approved designee. Cypress College will - without delay; and taking into account the safety of the community — determine the appropriate nature and content of the notification and initiate its emergency communications protocol. Exceptions may apply if, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, notification would compromise efforts to assist victims or to respond to the emergency. Emergency notifications will be delivered in a manner determined to have the ability to most-effectively reach those facing the threat. Possible communications methods may include: text messaging, social media sites managed by the college, including Facebook, Twitter, and Nixle; the Cypress College website; the MyGateway portal; traditional media outlets; mass-communication systems for telephone, cellular, and/or email; the campus marquee and other digital message boards; public address system; and mobile radio.

Text Messaging Subscription Instructions

Students are encouraged to utilize [myGateway](#) to update their personal information to facilitate contact from Cypress College, including text alert messaging in the event of an emergency. Students are automatically subscribed for emergency text notifications upon their enrollment at Cypress College. To verify accuracy of cellphone number and other personal information, follow these steps:

- Sign into [MyGateway](#).
- Go to the “Personal Information” channel under the “Student” tab.
- Click on the item “Set Text Message Alert Preferences.” When clicking on “Set Text Message Alert Preferences,” the next screen will allow you to enter your cell phone information, the cellular service provider, the level of messages you wish to receive and the campus or campuses you want to be notified about.
- After entering your information, click on the “Submit” button.

Anaheim Campus Safety Information

At the Anaheim Campus, we are interested in the welfare, security and safety of every individual. However, maintaining a safe and secure campus environment can only be achieved through a cooperative effort of the entire campus community. The safety and well-being of all members of our community is our priority. We are committed to building partnerships for the betterment of our campus community.

Operational Hours and Building Tower Security Access

The Anaheim Campus operational hours are Monday - Friday, 7 a.m. - 10 p.m. and Saturday from 7:30 a.m. – 3 p.m., excluding District holidays. The main double-doors of the second level entrance to the building are locked at 7:30 p.m., which is the time the SCE registration counter closes. The side door, second level, by the elevators is locked at 8 p.m. This is done as a safety precaution for securing the building. Employees who work in the evening may request access to the side door up until 10 p.m. by completing an Access Control Record Form available from and to be signed by their immediate supervisor. Access into the building through the first floor main entrance is available during campus operating hours.

Anaheim Campus Security Office

NOCCCD Security Officers are on duty Monday – Friday from 6:30 a.m. - 11 p.m., and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. - 4 p.m. The District contracts additional security services with Pacwest to patrol the campus during non-operational hours and as needed to ensure coverage.

The Anaheim Campus Security Office works closely with the Anaheim Police Department. Criminal incidents are referred to the Anaheim Police Department. All victims and witnesses are strongly encouraged to immediately report crimes to Campus Security and/or the Anaheim Police Department.

Reporting a Crime or an Emergency

At the Anaheim Campus, crime prevention is a partnership between the Anaheim Campus Security Office and the community it serves. Anaheim Campus security officers will respond and address all criminal activity and emergency situations. All students, staff, and visitors are encouraged to report criminal activity, suspicious persons and suspicious activity to Campus Security immediately. In the event you are a witness or a victim of crime please contact the Campus Security Office at (714) 808-4911 or Anaheim Police Department at (714) 765-1900.

In an emergency (life-threatening) situation, you should dial 911 first from a personal phone or 9-911 from a campus phone. Campus Security will respond to your call directly and involve local police, fire, ambulance and other services as needed. Campus Security will meet the emergency responders and direct them to the proper location.

Contacting Campus Security

Security may be reached at ext. 84911 from a campus phone or at (714) 808-4911 from your personal phone.

Emergency Communication – Code Blue Phones

The Anaheim Campus has six Code Blue posts located in the parking lots. These are intended to provide members of our campus community with an efficient method of contacting Campus Security in the event of an emergency. Individuals may press the red button to call for help. The call goes directly to the cell phone of Security personnel on duty. Cameras in the area will zoom in to capture activity.

Code Blue posts are located in the following areas:

- 2nd Level Staff Parking - south end
- West Parking Lot - south end
- West Parking Lot - east end
- South side parking – west end
- South side parking – east end
- East side parking – across from playground

Escort Services

We encourage faculty, staff and students who are here in the evening to walk in groups to the parking lot. Campus Security provides escort services as an alternative to walking alone. You may contact security at (714) 808-4911 to make arrangements. Advance notice is appreciated.

Campus Safety Suggestion Box

Feedback for maintaining and improving campus safety is welcome. A Safety Suggestion Box is located on the second floor of the Anaheim Building. The Anaheim Campus Safety Committee reviews suggestions by students and staff on a regular basis.

Emergency Procedures

Emergency procedures are posted in every classroom and evacuation routes are posted at each elevator for the corresponding floor. To promote preparedness in the event of an emergency, the Anaheim Campus participates in **emergency drills**.

Stryker chairs located in the west stairwells by the main elevators on the 3rd, 4th, 6th, 8th and 9th floors may be used by trained faculty and staff to assist a disabled person down the stairs in an emergency. It is important that instructors account for their students by taking roll and remain with their students at the evacuation site, West Parking Lot.

Timely Warning Notice

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure Act defines specific crimes that require a timely warning notice to be issued. Any situation or incident involving a serious or continuing threat to the person and/or property of students and employees will constitute that a timely warning be sent to the campus community.

Emergency Notification

Unlike the timely warning that must be issued across the campus community, emergency notifications may be targeted to only a segment or segments of the campus community that are at risk. Anaheim Campus officials will assess who is at risk and how each segment will receive the notification. When there is a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees occurring on the campus, the Anaheim Campus will issue the timely warning and or emergency notification “without delay, taking into account the safety of the community.” The only exception is if doing so would “compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.” This determination will be made based upon the professional judgment of responsible authorities. In some cases both an emergency notification and a timely warning will be distributed to the community.

The Director of Campus Communications or designee will immediately disseminate information to the campus community through various outlets, which may include, but are not limited to: the SCE/NOCCCD website, social media sites, traditional media outlets, MyGateway Portal, and mass alert systems for telephone, cell, email, and/or text messages.

Emergency Alert System

In case of an emergency, the North Orange County Community College District will utilize a variety of incident notification alerts, including: phone calls, text messages, emails, social media blasts, as well as timely warnings and other written notifications.

Sex Offender Registration Policy

Sex offenders are required to register with Anaheim Police Department and the Campus Safety Department at the beginning of each term. Information regarding Megan’s Law and Sex Offender Registrants can be found on the following links:

Safety on Campus

You can reduce your chances of becoming a victim. Criminals often look for unsuspecting victims. It's up to you to reduce their window of opportunity:

- Don't assume you and your belongings are safe because you are on campus
- When you arrive on campus, remember to secure your vehicle and remove your keys
- While walking, have at least one hand free and avoid isolated areas. Be alert and aware of your surroundings at all times, paying attention to the people near and around you.
- Always walk with confidence and at a steady pace. Scan the area while walking and develop a plan of action in your mind should a stranger approach you.
- Always pay attention to your intuition; if you think a situation is unsafe, it may very well be
- Crime occurs during the daytime hours as well as at night. Do not let your guard down just because it's daylight
- Protect your personal belongings at all times. Do not leave your property unattended while on campus. Do not leave personal items in plain view in your vehicle.
- When leaving campus, use the buddy system. Walk with other employees or students when going to your vehicle, or you may request an escort from Campus Security.
- Walk in well-traveled and well lighted areas. Stay away from isolated areas.
- Don't have your hands full. Have your keys in your hand and whenever possible, carry books or personal items in a back pack or briefcase.
- Before entering your vehicle, look underneath, inside, and in the backseat. Enter your car and lock all your doors. If you believe someone is following you, blow your horn to get the attention of someone or drive to a police station or other public place where people are around and again, blow your horn.
- If you have a cell phone, call for police assistance and provide a license plate number, vehicle description, and a description of the subject(s)

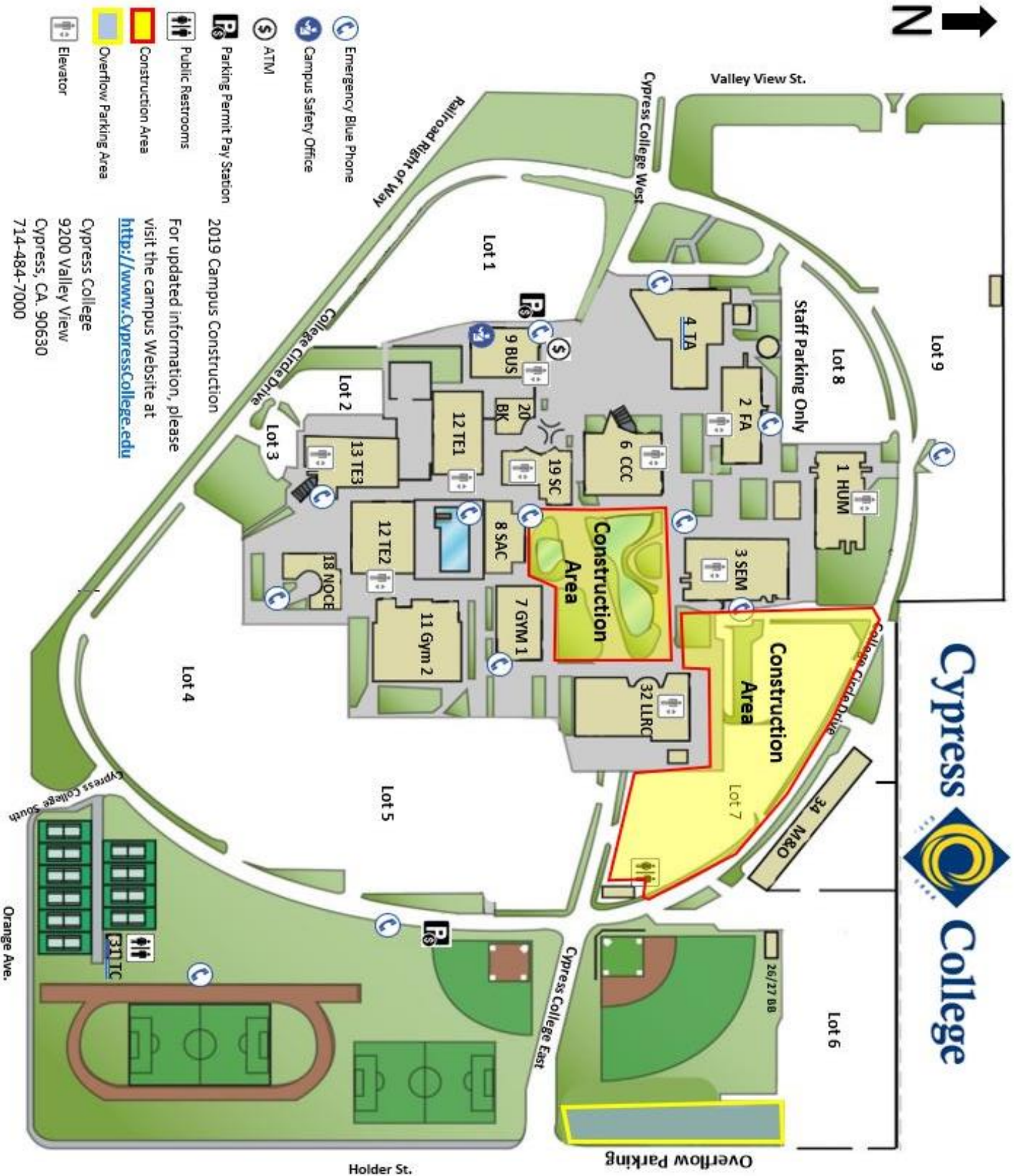

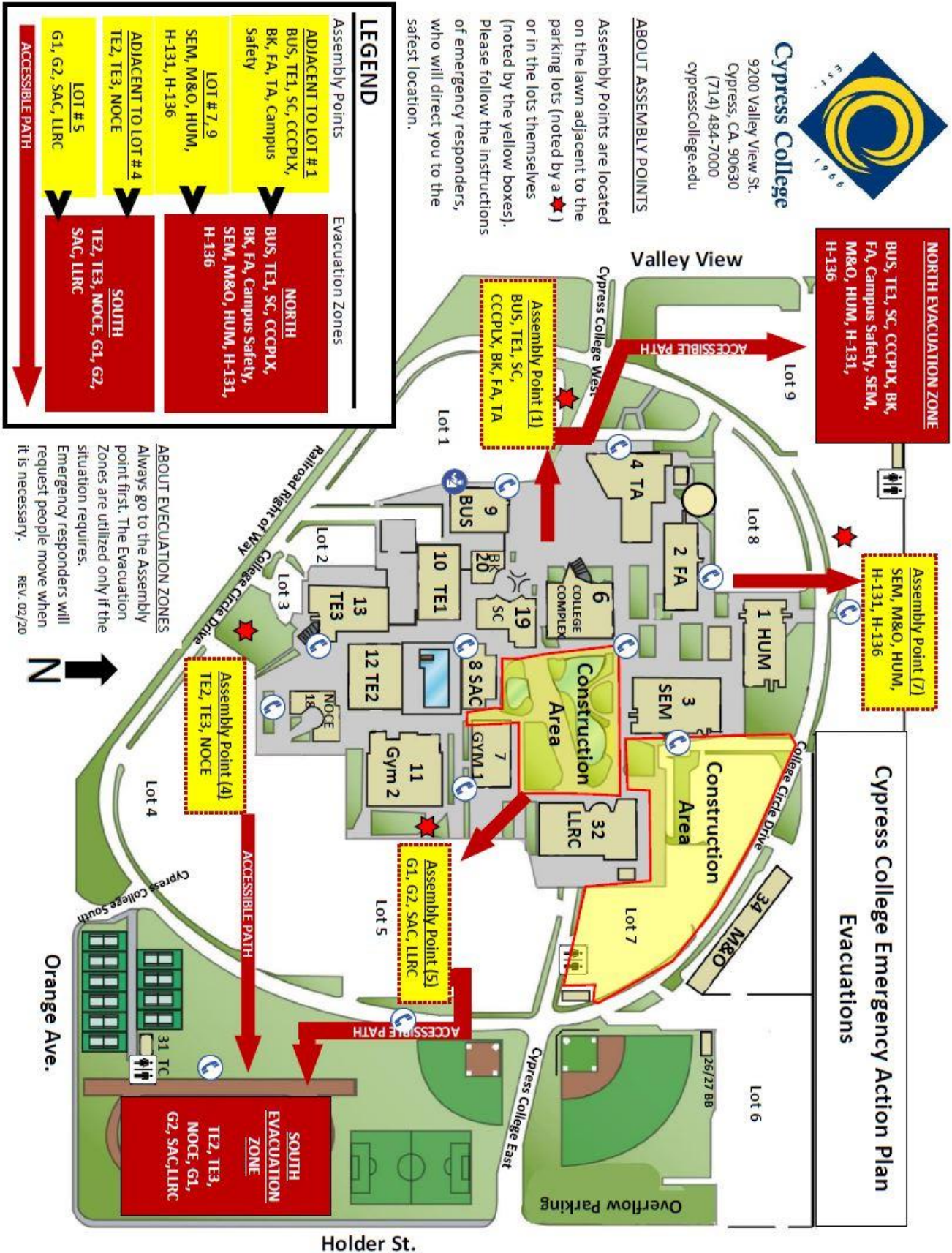

Cypress College Campus Emergency Phone Location Map



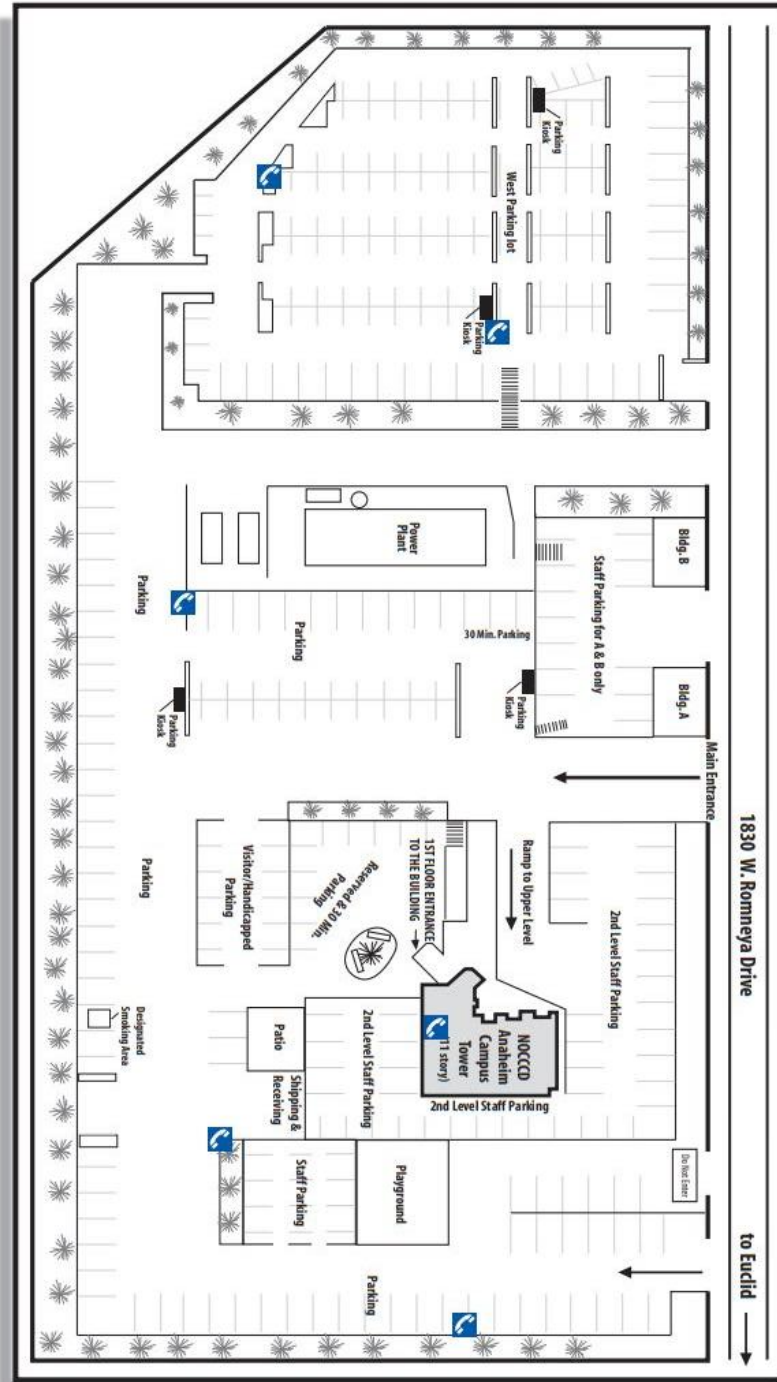
Cypress College Emergency Evacuations Map
